Additional security staff have been hired, as well as more MPD officers

- There are 3 security stations throughout the skyway that are manned from 7am-1pm, and 3pm-9pm.
- They have digital logs for all security officers so they know how often each area of the ramps are being walked
- They have increased their efforts in trespassing people
- They have added some T3 units (segways) to allow them to get between the ramps faster
- The crime statistics for 2017-2018 show that crime is down 45% in the ramps
- They have added LED lighting throughout the ramps, as well as on the outsides
- Signs were added to all intercoms with a phone number to call
- This phone is monitored by the same people who monitor the intercoms, it
 just allows you to be more discreet when contacting Ramp Security
- You can also use the intercoms or this phone number to ask for an escort to your vehicle in the ramps

Security cameras were all upgraded to high definition and 40 mobile cameras were also added

- Cameras are monitored by Ramp Security at all times
- The camera system is the same one the MPD use throughout the city
- They have started doing late night soft closures in multiple ramps
- Only one entrance is open after midnight
- They have a security person stationed at this entrance
- This is in place 7 days/week

Downtown Minneapolis population nears 50,000 after a big year; top employers ranked

There's a shade under 50,000 people living in downtown Minneapolis after the city's core added 6,325 residents in 2018, an increase of 14.5 percent.

Those numbers come from the Minneapolis Downtown Council. which held its annual meeting Wednesday at the Armory.

The current population of downtown now stands at 49,721, up from 31,844 in 2006, according to the council. The gains in 2018 comes on top of a 6 percent increase in 2017.

Last year the city issued \$1.5 billion in construction permits. The \$1.8 billion is the highest total in Minneapolis history, except for the \$2 billion issued in 2014, when U.S. Bank Stadium was under construction, according to city of Minneapolis data.

Askov Finlayson, the boutique North Loop mens' shop, will temporarily close, and will reopen later this year selling only Askov Finlayson merchandise.



Wilson & Willy's will close North Loop boutique, shift online

Wilson & Willy's, an apparel and accessories shop that's had a five-year run in Minneapolis' North Loop neighborhood, is calling it quits.

Mpls/St. Paul magazine reports on the move by owner John Mooty, who initially wanted a physical store to better connect with customers, but ultimately decided "economics of this structure at our scale was not enough to justify continuing."

During the store's run, Mooty revived the old Minnesota brand Northwestern Knitting Co. (aka NWKC), which started out in the 1800s making Munsingwear undergarments. The rebooted NWKC sells T-shirts, sweaters and other products and was the fastest-growing part of Wilson & Willy's, Mooty said. He'll continue building that brand and aims to add others.

Plan for 800-stall parking ramp in the North Loop takes shape

The Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis wants to build an 800-stall parking ramp next to its North Loop headquarters.

A proposal for the five-level ramp will go before the Minneapolis Planning Commission of the Whole Jan. 31.

The ramp will replace a 300-stall surface parking lot that the Federal Reserve bought from the Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority in April for \$7.5 million.


The Federal Reserve has 1,200 employees, many of which have used nearby surface parking lots, in addition to the 280 stalls under the office building.





Developer would replace 1800s North Loop building with apartments

A Minneapolis developer plans to demolish a small North Loop building and replace it with 59 apartments.

Kim Perry, representing 310 Development, is asking the Historic Preservation Commission in Minneapolis for permission to tear down a two-level building at 310 Second St. N, part of which dates back to 1883.

The structure was originally used as apartments, but the economics of the area deteriorated in the 1900s. In 1919, a "drunken gunfight in the building led to injuries and a death," so it was converted to a warehouse in 1920, according to a report done for the project by Minneapolis-based Landscape Research.





310 Development wants to replace an 1800s North Loop building with a six-level apartment building.

From 1944 to 1968 it was home to toy factory The Judy Co. until Hymie and Ruth Berman sold the business.

The report concluded the structure is not historically significant since it wasn't originally constructed as a warehouse like most other North Loop buildings that have been preserved as lofts over the past couple decades. The Bermans also made several additions to the building in the 1950s and 1960s, and those additions aren't significant like the 1800s warehouses nearby.

Perry, according to her application, would construct a six-level building with a mix of studios, one-bedroom and two-bedroom units. The project also would include 5,000 square feet of retail space and 124 parking stalls, most of which would be in three levels of underground parking.

Nearly a year after it was proposed to the city of Minneapolis, construction for the two-story Graze Provisions & Libations food hall in the North Loop neighborhood has begun, adding competition to a growing Twin Cities food hall scene.

Developers for the project believe that its North Loop location, its proximity to Target Field, local chef-driven concepts and year-round entertainment offerings will separate the concept from other food halls in the area.

The food hall will have 14,100 square feet of floor space with six kitchen slots, two indoor dining areas, two bars, a coffee shop

with a walk-up outdoor window, a communal outdoor space and a 3,100-square-foot patio. The building will be blocks away from Target Field and north of the intersection of Fourth Street North and Fifth Avenue North, behind Modist Brewing Co.

Five of the six kitchen slots have already been filled with local chefs — though <u>Greg Cuda</u>, a partner with Columbus, Ohio-based Derived Development Group, didn't identify any of them.

A seasonal poke concept that converts into a ramen concept in the fall and winter months

A vendor focused on southern-style cooking and soul food



Cool Offices: PowerObjects' new North Loop home embraces bright, playful vibe

You know you have a "cool" office on your hands when employees are jostling for a space in the new digs. That's exactly what happened to PowerObjects' Associate Vice President of Global Marketing Jeff Wedren when his company opened a new office in the TractorWorks Building in Minneapolis' North Loop neighborhood in June.

"We ran out of space in our building," explained Wedren, noting that the software implementation company that specializes in Microsoft business applications still occupies two floors in the

Soho Building, a block away. Globally, the company has grown 2,600 percent in the past decade.

Wedren moved about 100 Twin Cities employees — mostly project consultants and marketing staff — to the TractorWorks Building (named for its history as a John Deere tractor factory). The bright and modern design of the new space is one PowerObjects plans to implement in its offices around the world.

Working with PlanForce Group, PowerObjects took the raw and bare space on the eighth floor and created an office tailored to how it works.

"We wanted a blend of collaborative space with space to put your head down and get work done," Wedren said.

The new office features plenty of open space with a mix of half-wall cubicles and casual collaboration/presentation areas. It also sports four conference rooms and a number of modular offices. The semi-private offices have sliding glass doors, glass walls, four desks and a centralized table.

United Properties wins appeals in effort to build

United Properties will be allowed to build a covered hotel vehicle entrance and sky-high sign for RBC Wealth Management on its planned downtown Minneapolis tower thanks to a decision by the Minneapolis Zoning and Planning Committee Thursday.

The committee overruled several conditions that were placed on United Properties in its years-long effort to build what will be a 37. story tower at Hennepin Avenue, Washington Avenue and Nicollet



United Properties got a favorable vote to put a sign for RBC Wealth Management atop the 37-story tower it's planning on Nicollet Mall and Washington

Most notably, United Properties wanted what is known as a porte cochere along Hennepin Avenue, where vehicles could drop off or pick up guests. It also wanted what will become easily the tallest sign in downtown Minneapolis, at 484 feet.

Minneapolis-based United Properties, owned by the Pohlad family, told the city it would not be able to execute the project without the appeals being granted. United Properties President Bill Katter, in the Thursday meeting, noted that the reason the porte cochere was proposed on Hennepin Avenue is because the company couldn't put it along Washington Avenue, where Up is setting aside land for a Potential Nicollet Mall street car. He also noted that putting the front door of a Four Seasons Hotel on

City Council Member Lisa Goodman said that without the porte cochere, cars would just stop on Hennepin Avenue to drop off guests, blocking traffic and bicyclists. She also pointed out that all the

Developers are working on early plans to build a 10-story condo tower in the North Loop, using timber-frame construction similar to the nearby T3 office building.

The project is called TMBR and it a joint venture between Todd Simning, president of Excelsior-based Kroiss Development, and Colin Oglesbay, managing principal of Minneapolis architecture firm Dwyer Oglesbay. Kroiss is a luxury homebuilder, though Simning said he's also developed medium-scale multifamily projects in the southwest metro in his 31-year career.

TMBR would be a 10-story condo tower with 76 units at 100 Third Ave. N.

In the North Loop, they have a half-acre surface parking lot at 100 Third Ave. N. under contract. That site is across the street from Muse Event Center and up against the First Street bridge over the Cedar Lake Trail.

The proposal, which is before the Minneapolis Historic Preservation Commission, calls for 76 condos, 7,500 square feet of small-bay retail spaces and 108 parking stalls in three levels of underground parking. The building's exterior would have glass and terra cotta.

"Terra cotta has not been super common since 1890, but we are looking at making this fit into the area," Simning said of the North Loop, which has turned warehouses from the late 1800s into lofts.

Condo development in Minneapolis has been slow since the recession, but Ryan Cos. US Inc. and Arcadia are planning a 41-level tower in the Mill District called Eleven and Alatus is planning a 40-tower on the other side of the river called Alia. Both say they'll break ground this spring.





United Properties will lease ground floor space in its newest office building in Minneapolis' North Loop to a national food hall group.

The Minneapolis developer said on Thursday that Pittsburgh-based Galley Group will build an 8,748-square-foot food hall on the first floor of the mixed-use office currently under construction at 729 Washington Ave. N. Galley Group is the third tenant signed to 10-story the building. The food hall is scheduled to open in summer 2019, according to a United Properties press release.



WeWork adding yet another Twin Cities location, landing in the North Loop

Coworking giant WeWork is opening a third Twin Cities location, announcing Wednesday that it has signed a lease for a soon-to-open office building in the North Loop.

WeWork has signed a lease for 60,000 square feet in The Nordic, a 10-story mixed-use tower United Properties is building at 729 Washington Ave. N. The New York-based company will have floors five, six and seven. The sixth floor has outdoor terrace space for WeWork members.

When it opens this summer, the North Loop location will bring WeWork's total Twin Cities north of 200,000 square feet. It also has offices in Capella Tower downtown and MoZaic East, in Uptown.

"Since opening our first location in 2017, Minneapolis has welcomed WeWork with open arms. We've formed meaningful partnerships, hosted impactful events and provided our members with a global platform to grow their businesses," Megan Dodds, Midwest General Manager for


WeWork said in a news release. "We're thrilled to announce WeWork 729 N. Washington Ave. as our third Minneapolis location and look forward to continued growth in the Twin Cities."

According to Cushman & Wakefield numbers, there is more than 1 million square feet of coworking space in the Twin Cities. WeWork, with the North Loop lease, will become the largest player in the market, topping Regus, which has just under 200,000 square feet.

Digital marketing consultancy Ovative Group will join WeWork in The Nordic. Ovative announced two years ago it would lease 30,000 square feet in the building, moving from the nearby Loose-Wiles building that United Properties also owns.

The Nordic will be ready for office tenants in March. A plaza in between the building and The Freehouse will be complete in early summer.

Emily Nicoll and Brandon Megal of CBRE represented WeWork in the transaction and Tom Tracy, Katie Tufford and Peter Fitzgerald of Cushman & Wakefield represented United Properties.



CVS closing four Twin Cities locations, including two in downtown Minneapolis

CVS Corp. is closing four locations in the Twin Cities, including its stores on Hennepin and Portland avenues in downtown Minneapolis.

CVS (NYSE: CVS) confirmed that it will close its 13,500-square-foot store at 1110 Hennepin Ave. on April 2. It opened in 2008 and was the chain's first store in downtown Minneapolis. It will also close stores at 7996 Brooklyn Blvd. in Brooklyn Park and at 2426 W. Broadway in Minneapolis, CVS said.

That closure could not be confirmed by CVS. "We have no announcements for a store closure on Portland," said Mike DeAngelis, a CVS spokesperson, in an email.


DeAngelis also said CVS is working with employees affected by the store closings to place them in other positions in the company, including other store locations in the market. He said that certain employees will be eligible for a transition package.

"To ensure that the pharmacy customers of the closing stores will continue to have uninterrupted access to service, we are transferring their prescriptions to nearby CVS locations," he said.

According to its website, CVS currently has 61 pharmacies throughout Minnesota as well as 75 pharmacies within Target stores. CVS has more than 9,800 retail locations in 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Brazil.

CVS has seen a significant change in its business model over the last few years. It agreed to a \$1.9 billion deal with Minneapolis-based Target Corp. in 2015 to acquire, rebrand and operate the pharmacies and clinics inside Target stores, including the downtown Minneapolis Target store. In November 2018, it completed a \$69 billion merger with national insurer Aetna.

In its latest earnings call, CVS predicted a rough 2019, citing pressure on its pharmacy reimbursement business, and "structural and CVS-specific challenges in the long-term care space."




Minneapolis' hottest neighborhood just got a brand-new attraction: a small, versatile opera venue.

The Minnesota Opera, known for staging grand productions in the 1,900-seat Ordway Center in St. Paul, announced Wednesday that it had acquired the 350-person Lab Theater, in Minneapolis' North Loop.

The deal, which was finalized Tuesday, gives the organization another arrow in its quiver as it aims to diversify audiences and artists alike.

"It sounds like just a real estate transaction," said Jeninne McGee, an opera board member and senior vice president at Ameriprise. "But the Lab is really the central hub for activities that make opera inclusive, vibrant and relevant to the world we live in today."

Financials were not disclosed, but the venue cost the opera "as much as a production," said opera president and general director Ryan Taylor, who took the helm at the organization in 2016. That would put the price in the ballpark of \$1.5 to \$2 million.


