Construction starts on long-planned hotel in downtown Minneapolis

A couple of busy lodging developers have broken ground on a pair of hotels on the west side of downtown, a project that has been in the works for more than two years.

Bloomington-based JR Hospitality and Iowabased Hawkeye Hotels confirmed that they have begun construction on the dual-branded hotel with 215 rooms.

The city issued construction permits totalling \$17.3 million on March 3, a couple weeks before COVID-19 started its rapid spread in the Twin Cities. A spokeswoman from Hawkeye confirmed that construction had started and that it would continue. Further questions were referred to JR Hospitality, which couldn't be reached for comment.

Minneapolis-based Stahl Construction is the general contractor.

The hotels, each six stories, will be under the Cambia and Fairfield Inn & Suite flags.

Chicago developer scoops up the rest of Duffey paper property in North Loop with more big plans

CEDARst Cos., the Chicago firm that is redeveloping the former Duffey Paper warehouse on Washington Avenue, has a second act in the works that will bring another 345 apartments to the North Loop.

The company has purchased three more parcels of property that had been part of the C.J. Duffey Paper holdings for \$21.1 million. The parcels include a pair of warehouses at 600 Third St. N. and 300 Sixth Ave. N as well as a 0.75-acre surface parking lot at 246 Seventh Ave. N.

The two warehouses are recognizable by their third-floor skyway that crosses Third



CEDARst Cos. has purchased two North Loop warehouses connected by a skyway and will convert them into an apartment project.

That skyway will be utilized as part of the \$100 million-plus redevelopment that CEDARst announced on Thursday. It's planning to convert the larger building - which is eight stories and 275,000 square feet - into 260 apartments and 15,000 square feet of retail space on the ground floor. The smaller five-level building is slated for 50 apartments, 7,000 square feet of retail and a 20,000-square-foot amenity floor.

The amenity package is quite impressive, with plans for a bowling alley, paddle courts, swimming pool and a coworking center. The kicker is a rooftop ice rink that could be turned into a soccer field in the summer.

"We are challenging ourselves to be different in terms of our amenity offering," said CEDARst CEO Will Murphy said in an interview. "We are trying to separate ourselves from the herd."

On the surface lot, CEDARst is planning to construct a 284-space parking ramp that would be wrapped with 34 apartments and 20,000 square feet of street-level retail space.

"This development has something for everybody," Murphy said in a press release. "It is part adaptive reuse, part ground-up development, a landmark designation and we will be working with the State Historic Preservation Office to define scope and procure historic tax credits. The more complicated the deal, the more opportunity we see. It's going to be a beautiful project and great contribution to the neighborhood."

CEDARst's first Duffey project — the one it acquired on Washington Avenue in July — will begin construction within 30 days, Murphy said. That project will bring 190 apartments and 20,000 square feet of commercial space. CEDARst anticipates breaking ground on the second project in the fourth quarter of 2020.

Murphy said that developing two big projects during the pandemic gave CEDARst some pause.

"It's prudent to kind of reevaluate given the market condition," he said. "But we are generally a long-term holder on a 10-year investment horizon. Covid will be somewhat of a distance memory by then."

The first Duffey project will deliver in the summer of 2021, and the one announced Thursday will deliver in the summer of 2022. Murphy noted that the Covid-19 pandemic could result in a slowdown in development.

"There is some cautious optimism from our camp that on the supply side, in 2021 and 2022, deliverables will drop off because of Covid," he said. "So from that vantage point, if you could deliver in 18 months to two years, you could be in an advantageous position from a supply and demand perspective."

After almost 30 years, North Loop cafe Moose & Sadie's has closed

The coronavirus crisis claims another restaurant.

Longtime North Loop cafe Moose & Sadie's has closed.

In an Instagram post Tuesday night, owners Peter Kirihara and Susan Muskat wrote, "With immense sorrow, we have closed our doors for the last time. The economic impact of this crisis was just too much for our small business to overcome."

Moose & Sadie's opened in 1991 at 212 3rd Av. N. as a coffeehouse and quickly became a popular outpost on the fringes of what was then the Warehouse District. The surrounding blocks later evolved into the North Loop and the area became a dining, shopping and residential hot spot.

Kirihara's enterprise was part of a wave of next-generation coffeehouses (Muddy Waters, Caffetto, Cafe Wyrd, Dunn Bros., Uncommon Grounds, Espresso Royale, Caribou Coffee) that were popping up in the Twin Cities in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

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Streetscape Upgrades Continue

While much of the business activity in the North Loop has been temporarily scaled way back by the coronavirus outbreak, work is still progressing on major upgrades to the neighborhood streetscape.

New trees, LED street lamps and green grass now adorn areas that were quite stark and industrial-looking last year at this time—primarily along 3rd Street North and 5th and 6th Avenues.

It's the final phase of a \$9.3 million project to reconstruct and repave streets that had been among the most neglected in Minneapolis. In rebuilding and redesigning the streets, city crews created several new open spaces along the boulevard for trees and grass.
